Inside out, Where's the Win?

Blame Al Treen.
That's the late Al Treen, Dalmatian fancier, judge, husband of the irrepressible Esme Treen, tireless proponent of judges' workshop groups, and AKC Board member. Specifically, blame Al for the Dalmatian/Pointer cross all those years ago. The principle being someone's always to blame and if whoever's being condemned can't defend him or herself, well that just confirms culpability..... And for sure no one who's departed this mortal coil has yet been able to protect him or herself from whatever postmortem slings and arrows are sent their way.

Okay then, it is Al's fault. Done. Let's move on. Yeah, Sure. When plenty of fanciers' have their backs up about their breed, it will be a cold day in a hot place before there will be any kissing and making up. AKC/s November Board Minutes do hint at a compromise, not that the word "compromise" appears in the Minutes, under the heading "Registration of Dalmatian/Pointer Cross decedents"(sic) . By the way, for the umpteenth time, AKC's English language failures are going to land them in big trouble: The correct word is "descendants", definition- a

person or animal is descended from a specific ancestor'. "Decedent" is a term of law for "a deceased person". You can't make this stuff up. In any case, under the heading "Registration of Dalmatian/Pointer Cross decedents (sic) ", November minutes state "The Board agreed to a proposed agreement, pending acceptance of the Dalmatian Club of America (DCA Board), which would bring the matter to a vote by the DCA membership in June, 2011. The AKC Board would consider this vote, along with other factors in reaching its final decision." I'd like to believe what's in the Minutes means AKC has blessed a workable solution. If that means AKC's role has been one of mediator/facilitator, I say, "Good for AKC", Who thinks that's the story? There's no question every breed's custodian is its parent club. On breed specific matters AKC should be first and primarily dealing with parent clubs. Still there an odor emanating from this one: AKC's Board agrees to a proposal, but the Dalmatian Club of America's Board and its membership have to approve it? Pardon me, who's in charge here?

What's in the agreement? And what happens if the Dalmatian Board and membership don't approve? Something's out of whack.

AKC's Board has sole authority of its stud book. Permitting the Dalmatian Club's Board and then its membership to get into the act as outlined sets a precedent, albeit not binding. Part of the story has to be missing – without which there's something ridiculous and potentially dangerous afloat. It's easy thinking at least part of what's missing is the role played by the two Dalmatian fanciers on the AKC's Board. Given their track record – wrongly participating in the Board's previous vote on the matter – it's easy concluding their wrongful participation in the Board's consideration of the Dalmatian/Pointer cross has continued.

I say 'wrong' advisedly. AKC is a New York State not-for-profit. As such it is under the jurisdiction of the Office of the Attorney General of the State of New York, which makes at least a dozen "Guides & Publications" available concerning charities and not-for-profits, including specifically, "Right from the Start: Responsibilities of Directors of Not-for-Profit Corporations.

That publication defines the responsibilities and expectations for directors of New York not-for-profits. Who thinks any lawyer would knowingly let a client who is a member of a New York not-for-profit board violate anything in that publication. Me, too.

Page 5 of "Right From The Start....." states about director conflicts. "The board of directors must be careful to examine

transactions that involve directors or officers, or individuals or entities with whom directors or officers are related or affiliated. The board must not approve any transaction that is not fair and reasonable, and a conflicted board member may not participate in the board vote"

No one needs a lawyer to understand what that means. The two Dalmatian fanciers on AKC's Board have been wrongly involved in the Board's handling of the Dalmatian/Pointer descendants. Their participation has exposed AKC to potential repercussions – serious ones.

Sometimes in such situations the cost of winning is tantamount to losing: Witness the complaint brought by the former president of the AKC Canine Health Foundation, which I have on impeccable authority cost AKC, the Health Foundation, and perhaps others a solid six figure amount in lawyers' fees. At least AKC seems to have won that one. How a winning defense can be crafted to the seemingly black and white, yes or no, charge that two conflicted Board members participated inappropriately in the Board's handling of the Dalmatian/Pointer descendants is hard to imagine. (Ed. Note: AKC totally denies it spent anything near the figure approximated by Mr. Mandeville.)

AKC's biggest headache may be that the Dalmatian/Pointer cross was done in furtherance of Dalmatian health. Combine that with no Dalmatian breeder ever has to breed to them and those who don't like us are potentially being given a loaded gun. They will be quick to exploit denying a registration to dogs

whose DNA presumably says they're Dalmatians, Dalmatians free of a significant health defect. Were that to hit the fan all shades of gray – really of even 'right' and 'wrong' – will go out the window to our detriment. The potential for it getting ugly is unlimited. So, is the Board's "proposed agreement" the win-win resolution needed? Here's hoping.



Dog Show People

A Newcomers Field Guide

Continuing from last month, the '**Spotted Copy**' will be running a very tongue in cheek look at dog shows. The author picks on everyone, so don't be offended.

Ms. Lewin divides dog show people into two categories, those with and those without dogs. We appreciate Ms. Lewin's generosity in sharing her observations and wit. Ms. Lewin is a Dalmation owner, breeder, DCA judge and handler.

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To a novice, a dog show can be a daunting experience. The initial impression is often one of a single-purpose county fair where many grim-faced people run about with numbers on their arms and dogs in tow, and where, if one can judge by their facial expression, only about 1 in 20 of them is actually having fun.

OFFICIAL

PHOTOGRAPHERS:

The Official Photographer (OP) looks like someone on safari, but without the attending gun bearers. Typical under-plumage is slacks, all-terrain shoes and a shirt with a many-pocketed vest over top of it. Over-plumage consists of a large camera, a flash unit and a battery pack, with lots of black cording attaching everything to everything else. OPs also carry a set of plastic signs around in one hand, and sometimes a tripod.

Despite these hindrances, they

are notably agile and can leap tall ring fences in a single bound. When summoned, they can calculate the light angle, plunk the sign rack on the ground, fix the signs in the frame to indicate the win, position the judge, handler and dog to best advantage, drop to their knees, focus the camera, center the picture, throw a toy, snap the shutter, record the exhibitor's armband number in a notebook, wind the film, and be up and gone to the next ring in thirty seconds or less. It is breathtaking.



OP behavior is noticeable for periods of frenetic activity interspersed with periods of total quiescence, during which time they actually remove their over-plumage and sit next to it on a grooming table. OP's tend to develop crow's feet due to weekends of peering into a viewfinder at the shows, alternating with weekdays of squinting at their airbrush work in the darkroom. The distinctive calls can vary in content but tend to be delivered in punchy, staccato bursts, such as "Rear foot! Your side! Back an inch!"

Breeder-Spectators:

BSs (forgive the acronym) are experienced dog people who, for whatever reason, are not showing that day but came to the show to watch. They are usually in casual (non-show) plumage and are

clumped at ringside, outside the tent. Like EOHs, they are often seen in small groups, huddled around the one catalog somebody bought or borrowed from a nearby NOH.

However, the distinctive mark of an armband is lacking from BSs, and they are dogless. Most easily distinguished in the field by their demeanor and call, timing your identification is critical: BSs tend to exhibit distinguishing behavior only as the judge is pointing to his or her selections. At that point they roll their eyes like agitated horses and shriek "You've got to be kidding!" (Alternate call: "Oh my GAWD!")

Non-Breeder Spectators (i.e., the General Public):

Identical to NOHs in general appearance and number of accouterments, except without a dog in tow. They fill this void in their lives by asking exhibitors if their child can pet their dog. This request is inevitably made right after said child has finished eating a hot dog and is covered with mustard, and the exhibitor is going in to show a Maltese which he just spent six hours grooming. NBSs are more likely to be seen wandering vaguely from ring to ring, or around the concession stands, rather than planted at ringside. When they do choose a ring to watch, they and their clan tend to stand annoyingly right in the ring gate, thereby preventing the exhibitors from

entering. Adult NBSs are often observed making erroneous instructional comments to their fledglings, such as, "Look, dear, see all the lovely Poodles!" (when pointing at a ring of Portuguese Water Dogs). A day in the company of a flock of NBSs can be very confusing for all concerned.

AKC Field

Representative: If ever the federal government wanted to fund a Stealth Dog Show Attendee, the AKC Field Representative, known as "the Rep", would be it. Very difficult to spot in the field due to the fact that only one attends any given show, they tend to appear like phantasms and then just as suddenly melt back into the crowd and disappear. The really skilled ones can disappear from view at ju-u-ust that precise moment when one's eyes become focused on them, making one think one didn't really see them at all.



Because they are supposed to attend the show as the ambassador from the AKC to observe judges, answer questions, mediate disputes and calm the hysterical, they are rarely around when you need one. However, the Rep

can most often be pinned down at the Superintendent's tent or in the vicinity of whatever club facility houses the public address system. When on stealth duty, they sit decorously at ringside, pretending to chat discreetly with a friend while actually observing the judge.



After said judge notices that the Rep is watching, and has passed at least one quart of nervous perspiration, the Rep jots a few notes, smiles mysteriously, picks up his or her chair, and silently moves on to a new quarry.

AKC Reps look like adult JHs -- impeccably dressed, shod and coiffed, but sometimes with the additional 'je ne sais quoi' of a hat. Male Reps seem to go for the tweedy-Englishcountry-gentleman look, while female Reps often favor swoopy, broad-brimmed confections which may involve feathers.

Both male and female Reps have that certain uppercrusty aloofness which surrounds all those who wield a lot of power. This above-it-all aura acts as a natural repellent to dirt, dog hair and most

people, and allows the Reps to attend multiple dog shows in their best attire, in all kinds of weather, without getting so much as a micron of dust or a whisper of calumny on themselves.



Option 1 -

At Routes 480 & 271 intersection, to get to Route 422-east into Solon and Bainbridge. Take Route 422 east and get off at Route 306 in Bainbridge. Make a right turn on Route 306 south. VERY QUICKLY – not even a ½ a block, at first street, make a right turn onto Bainbridge Rd. After 3 miles, go up a large hill, will see street construction, row of hedges and stone columns on your left side. Make a left onto Dorset (Thornbury Development), make first right onto Cortina Circle. (the circle is just after 3 houses on your right). Our house is 3rd driveway on the left.

Option 2 -

Get to Routes 480 & 271 intersection to get to Route 422 east into Solon. Make a RIGHT turn to go south on Route 91. Go to 4th Street light and make a LEFT turn onto Route 43 (big intersection) Go about 2.5 miles (about half way mark will be a traffic light – Liberty Road) Flanders will be on the left, a couple of streets past “Park Place Nursery” sign on the right. Make a left turn onto Flanders. If you pass a second street light, you have gone too far. Once on Flanders, make first RIGHT onto Winston. Then make a RIGHT on Dorset. Pass big woods and make first left on Cortina, third driveway on the left.

How To Switch Your Dog's Diet

As more information about diet come to the surface, many a dog owner will consider changing the diet to the best available so the dog will have good health and live to a ripe old age.

However, it's important for any dog owner to take precautions when changing a diet. The following steps are suggested in a manner that can be done effectively without throwing the dog off balance:

Step 1: During such times as changing owners or moving to a new location, it's best not to change the diet to avoid too much unnecessary emotional strain on the dog. Once the dog becomes accustomed to the

new owner or living environment, then would be the right time to plan changing the dog's diet.

Step 2: When changing the diet, start with replacing only 25% of the old food with the new. Most dogs will not be able to notice any difference if the old and the new are mixed well enough. They should eat the new mixture as well as the old diet. Although some might not get used to the new diet initially, use patience to allow for the break-in period to complete. It has taken the dog many months to get used to its old diet; so it might sometimes take as long.

Step 3: Mix and replace 50% of the old diet with the new, make a little less effort to hide the new diet from the dog as it should be more receptive to the new food presented in the mixture now.

Step 4: This time, it should be easily understood that 75% of the new food be substituted with the old one. At this stage, the dog should accept this newly mixed diet as "a-matter-of-fact" manner. It should eat the dog food without any sign of hesitation when first fed.

Step 5: At this point, the dog should be accepting the newly mixed and replaced diet without any problem at all. Just like humans, dogs are uniquely different and some are bound to require more patience and attention therefore don't become discouraged too easily when the dog is not fitting into the new diet in the beginning. After all, changing a dog's diet is often a time consuming process that should be done with care and understanding.
